| <b>Complete information</b><br>Identify the matchup, legal position, point of contact and effect before ruling.  | <b>Not hesitation</b><br>Patience is deliberate processing. Hesitation is uncertainty without a plan.                                |
| <b>Not swallowing the whistle</b><br>Obvious illegal contact still requires a call, regardless of score or time. | <b>Not outcome officiating</b><br>A missed shot does not automatically prove a foul, and a made shot does not erase illegal contact. |

**Patient does not mean late. It means informed.**

| <b>1. Defender</b><br>Was legal guarding position established and maintained?                                        | <b>2. Contact</b><br>Where, when and by whom did contact occur?                 |
| <b>3. Effect</b><br>Did the contact affect rhythm, speed, balance or quickness—or create another clear disadvantage? | <b>4. Ruling</b><br>Choose the rule-based decision, then communicate it calmly. |

**Legality + contact + consequence = a defensible decision.**

## WHERE OFFICIALS GET RUSHED

| <b>Drives</b><br>Do not react to bodies falling before identifying the primary and help defenders.    | <b>Rebounding</b><br>Locate opponents before the ball comes off the rim and get the first illegal act.              |
| <b>Shooting</b><br>Stay with the shooter through landing; do not follow the flight of the ball.       | <b>Loose balls</b><br>Allow a legal recovery attempt while watching for displacement, holding or dangerous contact. |
| <b>End of game</b><br>Do not change the standard because the clock is visible or the crowd is louder. |                                                                                                                     |

| <b>Film pause</b><br>Stop clips just before contact and state defender, legality, likely contact and coverage.    | <b>Silent count</b><br>In practice, use a brief internal “see it” cue before sounding the whistle. |
| <b>Call journal</b><br>Record marginal whistles and identify whether angle, distance or anticipation caused them. | <b>Partner review</b><br>Ask whether your whistle supported the crew’s timing and coverage.        |
| <b>Game goal</b><br>Choose one setting—drives, rebounding or shooting—and deliberately finish every play.         |                                                                                                    |

**The strongest whistle is the one backed by a complete picture.**
